COVID-19 Molecular Tests Milestone: AdvaMed announced yesterday that total U.S. shipments of COVID-19 molecular diagnostic tests have reached more than 150 million, based on the latest data from the association's COVID-19 testing supply registry. Pandemic Snapshot

Global: Current Cases: 30,238,000 Deaths: 946,911

- Israel, Bahrain, Montenegro, and Costa Rica are reporting rapidly increasing daily new cases. Israel announced last weekend that it will impose a second nationwide lockdown lasting at least three weeks.
- India's epidemic continues to accelerate, nearing 100,000 new cases recorded per day.

United States: Current Cases: 6,709,600 Deaths: 197,736

- Cases continue to rise in the Midwest, and although testing is also increasing in many of those states, there are a few where new cases are outpacing new testing (including Wisconsin, whose cases increased by 65% this week).
- Hospitalizations continue to decrease in the West and South.
- It will take a few weeks to see if the wildfires in Oregon and California have had any impact on COVID-19 transmission.

Rapid Tests: A <u>survey by Kaiser Health News</u> found that over 20 states aren't including all results from rapid antigen tests in their case numbers, creating a blind spot in national data. Twenty-one states and the District of Columbia do not report all antigen test results, and 15 states and the District of Columbia do not report any positive results from antigen tests. This means that positive case counts may be artificially low in those states. Part of the issue is that CDC guidance defines positive results from PCR testing as "confirmed" cases and positive results from antigen tests as "probable" cases — which is why some states leave them out of their confirmed case numbers. As states adopt more rapid antigen testing, confirmed (PCR) cases may decrease, falsely implying that new cases are truly decreasing in that state.

COVID-19 Youth Deaths: This week's CDC Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report includes an <u>analysis</u> <u>examining 121 SARS-CoV-2-associated deaths</u> among persons under 21 years of age. Researchers found that many of the same factors associated with death in older populations were also true for younger populations. There was a disproportionate burden of death among children and young adults with underlying health conditions and those who were Black, Hispanic, or American Indian/Alaska Native.

Operation Warp Speed Vaccine Distribution Strategy: HHS and DoD released several documents this week outlining Operation Warp Speed's strategy for distributing a SARS-CoV-2 vaccine. Following authorization or approval of a vaccine, allocation will be based on CDC prioritization models, which will be developed by an independent advisory board with input from the National Academies of Sciences. Monoclonal Antibodies: Eli Lilly reported encouraging interim results from a placebo-controlled trial of a monoclonal antibody treatment that showed a 72% reduced risk of being hospitalized for patients with mild or moderate COVID-19 who received the antibody versus those who received the placebo. The drug also reduced the level of SARS-CoV-2 in the body faster in patients who received the antibody. Monoclonal antibodies are laboratory-produced proteins designed to act like human antibodies against specific pathogens in the immune system. Multiple companies are reportedly developing monoclonal antibody treatments for COVID-19, but Eli Lilly is the first to release preliminary results. The trial is not complete and full results will need to be vetted through the peer review process, but the initial results are promising for this type of treatment.
